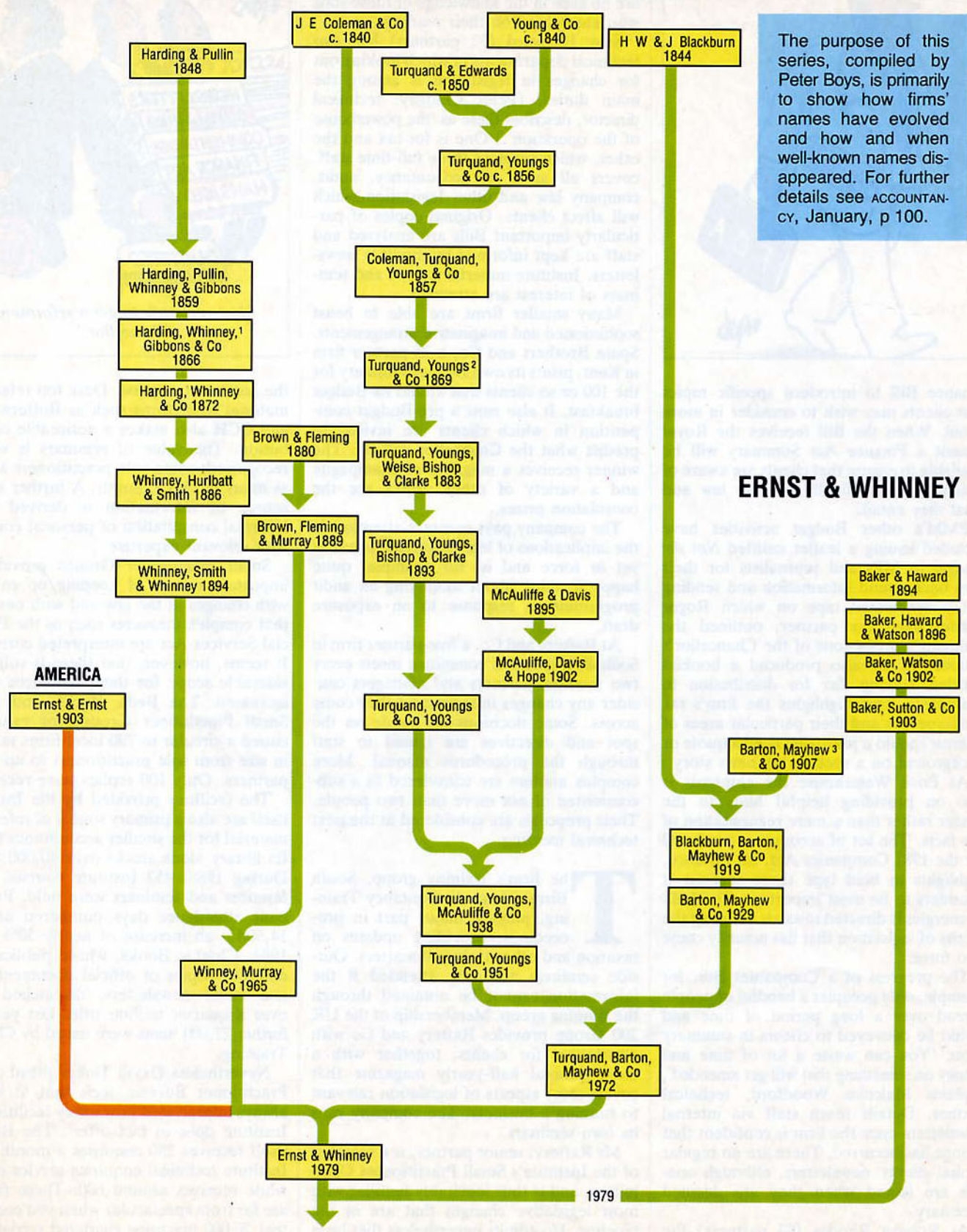

ERNST & WHINNEY

Notes
 1. Robert Palmer Harding was a member of the first Council of the Institute of Accountants in London (1870) and of the ICAEW's first Council. He was the first vice-president of the ICAEW and its president 1882-83. Frederick Whinney was a member of the first Council of the ICAEW and its president 1884-88. His son, Sir Arthur Francis Whinney KBE, was president 1926-27. J B Gibbons was a founding member of the Institute of Accountants in London and a member of its first Council.
 2. William Turquand was a founding member of the Institute of Accountants in London and a member of its first Council. He was the first vice-president and from 1877 president of the old Institute. Turquand was a petitioner for the Royal Charter of the ICAEW, a member of its first Council and its first president 1880-82. John Young was a founding member of the Institute of Accountants in London and a member of its first Council. He was also a member of the first Council of the ICAEW.
 3. Harold Montague Barton was president of the ICAEW 1944-45.
